Roger Swartz

Colonial historian Roger G. Swartz received national acclaim for his two books covering the frontiers of the American Revolution. In 2004, he was chosen, along with 2 others, to be the educational coordinator for the 13-day bus tour sponsored by then National Elderhostel program for the 250th anniversary commemoration of the French & Indian War, 1754 – 1763.

Roger is owner of R.G. Swartz & Associates, offering historical services, workshop offerings, and historical products to educational institutions and historical organizations. He is the author of two nationally-acclaimed books dealing with the frontier history of Pennsylvania during the American Revolution. In 2002, he received the "Instructor of Honor" award from the Continuing Education program at Hagerstown Community College for his work with Elderhostel programs and with the Institute for Learning in Retirement. He holds two Masters degrees from Lehigh University: M.A.Ed. (1969); and M.P.A. (Master in Public Administration), 1981. He and his wife reside in Keedysville, MD.



ILR848 James Monroe and the Era of Good & Bad Feelings

6 sessions, 12 hours

This course will cover the life and two-term presidency of James Monroe, our fifth president. We'll discuss his roles and leadership as Secretary of State and War during the War of 1812. Next, we'll analyze Monroe's role in the expansion of the nation through land acquisitions, an emerging transportation revolution, and the Monroe Doctrine. We'll also assess his political philosophy and address these questions: Was the "Era of Good Feelings" meant to bring the country together following the War of 1812? Or was it meant to subjugate all political opposition from the Federalist Party? What were the consequences to the country dominated by one political party?

This course will cover the demographics of the Continental Army during the American Revolution. Groups discussed include women, Germans (including the Hessians), Scots-Irish, Native Americans, and Afro-Americans. We'll cover the "social contract" or "labor contract" between the army and its enlistees, and what happens when the men felt the officers violated the terms of their contract. Of the 57 known mutinies in the army, we'll concentrate on the ones involving the Pennsylvania Line, the New Jersey Line, and the Newburgh Conspiracy involving officers. In each we'll cover the causes, the events, and the impacts.

ILR337 Music Appreciation from a Historical Perspective

6 sessions, 12 hours

What is that music? Have you ever wondered why different time periods have different styles of music or why you listen and enjoy certain types of music? In this course, we will have a quick overview of critical time periods and the music that resulted from (or triggered) the events of that time. You may find that your current ideas change or that beliefs about music that you have always held are correct.

Instructor: Lynn Fleming is currently principal bassist with the National String Symphonia, and free-lances in and around Maryland with several orchestras. Additionally, she has conducted a number of orchestras in the area, including Westminster Symphony Orchestra. A recent participant of the InterHarmony Music Festival in Italy she is currently the director and conductor of the Frederick Community College String Ensemble. A consummate educator, Ms. Fleming recently was invited to Florida State University in Tallahassee where she ran a master class for college students. A graduate of the Juilliard School of Music, Ms. Fleming spent ten years teaching and performing in Venezuela with the Maracaibo Symphony Orchestra. Upon her return to the United States, Ms. Fleming joined the faculty of the Juilliard School Music Advancement Program where she taught double bass as well as performing with some of the premier ensembles in NYC and the surrounding area.

ILR466 Dark Energy, Dark Matter: Part 2

7 sessions, 14 hours

We used to think that if you can't see or measure something, there was nothing there. Modern thinking and great technological advances have shown that there is far more to the Universe than what we can see and measure. Vera Rubin, an astronomer associated with the Carnegie Institute, showed that galaxies rotated in a way that was at odds with the accepted laws of motion. This led to the introduction of "Dark Matter", a substance that can neither be measured or observed directly. Similarly, the observed phenomenon that the galaxies are not only rushing away from us, but are doing so at an ever increasing rate, has led to the acceptance of a new component in the Universe called Dark Energy. Learn more about this mysterious part of our Universe this spring. No technical or mathematical background necessary.

Instructor: Bob Rubock graduated with a BS in Electrical Engineering from Rensselaer and a Master of Science in Electrical Engineer from the University of Connecticut. He began his career in electronic warfare at United Aircraft but eventually turned to design of spacecraft for humanitarian purposes at NASA. ILR323 Due Process, Privileges or Immunities and State Action: The Fourteenth Amendment and Beyond

Consider the uniquely American approach to State Action as it applies to the obligations of the several states to provide certain privileges and immunities and due process to their citizens. These rights are conferred on the citizenry by the Fourteenth Amendment which provides "No state shall make or enforce any law which shall abridge the privileges or immunities of citizens of the United States; nor shall any state deprive any person of life, liberty, or property without due process of law...". We will consider the historical, sociological and political reason surrounding the adoption of the amendment and its application over time. We will consider The State Action Doctrine, The Privileges or Immunities Clause and substantive Due Process in matters including the right to marry, family integrity, rearing of children, birth control, abortion, sexual autonomy, marriage equality, assisted suicide, education, and welfare.

Mount Olivet Cemetery is one of the most beautiful and distinguished burying grounds in Maryland, if not the Mid-Atlantic. It was incorporated in 1852, as part of the rural/ garden cemetery movement. This genre employed a new design which took the cemetery out of the control of the church, and created an attractive park built on a grander scale. Other characteristics include using architectural design and careful planting, all inspired by the English garden movement of the early 19th century. Cemeteries of this period were enhanced by the Victorian style of sculpture and monuments which followed in the second half of the century. In addition, Mount Olivet is a virtual "mirror of Frederick history" including former politicians and business people, patriots from every war period, and state/ national luminaries such as Francis Scott Key, Thomas Johnson, Jr. and Barbara Fritchie. Chris Haugh will present a 3-week, "on-location" offering on the history of this "museum without walls." Guided tours of the grounds, monuments and structures on foot will be the central focus, as Chris plans to weave some PowerPoint and on-site illustrations into his lessons. Note: Wear comfortable shoes as this class requires moderate walking.

Instructor: Chris Haugh is an Emmy award-winning documentary film maker and regional historian. For nearly 25 years, Chris has researched, produced and published numerous award-winning presentations on Frederick County history. He has also taught both video production and public history courses for FCC, Hood College and Towson University.




